

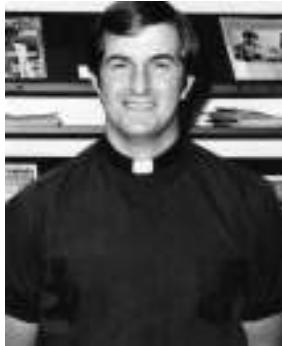

Kenrick-Glennon Seminary Bids Farewell to Fr. Tom Molini

In June of 1994, Rev. Thomas M. Molini came to Kenrick-Glennon Seminary as the College Director and Vice-Rector. A year later he was informed that he would serve as Vice-Rector and Dean of Students—and those are the positions he has held until the close of the 2003-04 academic year, at which point he was granted a three-month sabbatical at the Institute for

Continuing Theological Education at the North American College in Rome. When he returns from his sabbatical, Fr. Molini will be reassigned to a new position within the Archdiocese of St. Louis.

Looking back on his ten years of service at

Kenrick-Glennon Seminary, Fr. Molini feels that he has been blessed. "I was flattered to be brought on board at the seminary by then-Archbishop [Justin] Rigali," remarked Fr. Molini. "I had served in two parishes as an associate pastor for over eight years when he asked me to come to Kenrick-Glennon. And while it was difficult for me to be pulled out of the parish, it was also humbling to be asked to do this by the Archbishop and exciting to be involved in the formation of priests."

Fr. Molini's duties these past ten years have directly involved the daily life of the seminarians, as he has supervised the seminarians' human, spiritual, and pastoral programs, as well as coordinated their annual evaluations. Fr. Molini has had a hand in the admissions process into the seminary

as well. From one-on-one conversations with seminarians involving their progress in priestly formation, seeing to the good order of the house, organizing the seminary calendar, and consulting with other members of the formation staff about the seminarians and their progress, Fr. Molini's experience as Vice-Rector and Dean of Students at Kenrick-Glennon Seminary has been a journey of challenges and blessings.

"As Vice-Rector and Dean of Students, I've gotten to know so many of those men who are and who will be priests throughout the Midwest," remarked Fr. Molini. "Kenrick-Glennon has formed so many wonderful priests, and I look forward to continuing to work with them when I return from my sabbatical."
