Remembering Seminary Professor Msgr. John Byrne

Msgr. John T. Byrne was a man who found joy in his priesthood and in his Irish heritage. His friends knew that he was never to be considered among the “silent Irish.”

Msgr. Byrne was ordained by John Cardinal Glennon in 1945. His first assignment was to the St. Louis Cathedral. After only six months at the Cathedral, Cardinal Glennon asked him to serve temporarily at St. Mark’s Parish to replace the Cardinal’s nephew. The nephew was going to visit Ireland, which he did, but he did not return, and so Msgr. Byrne spent the next ten years at St. Mark’s.

In 1955 Archbishop Joseph Ritter asked Msgr. Byrne to go to Catholic University in Washington D.C. to obtain a doctorate in education. He received his doctorate and then remained at Catholic U. for a few years as a professor. He returned to St.

Louis in 1961 and then Cardinal Ritter asked him to establish Most Precious Blood Parish and to teach at Cardinal Glennon College.

Msgr. Byrne taught at the college seminary from 1962 until the mid

1980’s. He taught psychology, counseling, and catechetics. He also accompanied Cardinal Ritter to the Second Vatican Council. He was counted among the *periti* for the Cardinal.

Around 1970 John Cardinal Carberry asked Msgr. Byrne to establish a catechetical institute under the title of Paul VI Institute. Msgr. Byrne drew on the experience of many of the professors from the seminary and from St. Louis University. The Institute has helped to form and educate many of the catechists and permanent deacons of the Archdiocese. In the mid 1970’s Cardinal Carberry established the Theological Commission of the Arch-

diocese and Msgr. Byrne was chosen as the Chair.

In February of 1977 Msgr. Byrne became the pastor of Holy Redeemer Parish in Webster Groves. He continued to teach at Cardinal Glennon College and direct Paul VI Institute. With all this responsibility he still found time for his “holy hour” every day after lunch.

In June of 1983 he asked to be relieved of the responsibilities of being a pastor, and he became the chaplain to the sisters at Ursuline Academy in Glendale. He began to have some health issues and so around 1990 he moved to Our Lady of Life Apartments and served the residents of that community. By the late 1990’s the health issues became more serious and it was necessary for him to move to Mari de Villa Nursing Facility. He remained there until his death in August of 1999.

Msgr. John Byrne served faithfully as a priest of Jesus Christ for more than fifty-four years. He left his mark on the Archdiocese through his intellect, dedication and humor. The Church of St. Louis was well served by this man of faith.

Seminary Graced by Special Guests in September

Wednesday, September 10 saw the Order of Malta visit the seminary for an afternoon program arranged by Order of Malta member Carole Hess. Guest speaker Dr. Sandra Keating of the Vatican Commission for Religious Relations with Muslims presented on the topic of “Islam: What We Need to Know Today.” The Order of Malta members later joined the seminarians of the School of Theology for Rosary and Evening Prayer.

On the following evening, September 11, the seminary was privileged to host the 2008 Annual Catholic Appeal Council Appreciation Event.

In recognition for his leadership on the Council, outgoing ACA Chair Con Franey was enrolled as the 57th member of the “Order of St. Louis, King” for outstanding service to Christ and His Church. Bishop Robert J.

Hermann, archdiocesan administrator, presented the award. Peg Forrest was welcomed as the incoming Chair of the Annual Catholic Appeal Council.

Faculty News and Notes



This past September, the local chapter of the Catholic Library Association held its fall social at Kenrick-Glennon Seminary. The highlight of the Sunday afternoon gathering was a presentation by Dr. Paul M. Pearson, Director and Archivist of the Thomas Merton Center at Bellarmine University in Louisville, Kentucky. Following greetings by **Dr. Andrew J. Sopko** (pictured above), Director of the Souvay Library at Kenrick-Glennon Seminary, and Monsignor Ted L. Wojcicki, President-Rector of the seminary, Dr. Pearson spoke about Merton's writing career both before and during his years as a world-famous Trappist monk.

Kenrick-Glennon Seminary was chosen as the venue for the CLA meeting since its library possesses an extensive Merton Collection. That collection was highlighted during a library tour following Dr. Pearson's presentation. As a memento of his visit, he presented two recently-published books by Merton as additions to the Souvay Library. The afternoon concluded with a reception that enabled CLA members to socialize as well as better acquaint themselves with the library's facilities.



Saint Joseph's Communication has re-issued the 3-CD set, *Islam through Catholic Eyes*, produced last year by **Fr. Michael John Witt**, Associate Professor of Church History, and Father André Mhanna, adjunct professor and Rector of Saint Raymond's Maronite Cathedral. The first CD outlines a history of Catholic-Muslim relations while the other two cover theological points of agreement and

disagreement between these two great faiths.



Fr. Jack Hunthausen, S.J., Spiritual Director of the Kenrick School of Theology, assisted at a Penance Service at Villa Duchesne School for students and parents on November 4. On November 10 he celebrated the Eucharist for the deceased of the Knights of Columbus Council at Old St. Ferdinand's Shrine in Florissant, Missouri. He gave presentations on the Examen Prayer to two groups of the Bridges Program on November 17 and 19. Bridges is a program whereby people make the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius over a nine month period instead of in the traditional 30-day time frame.



In October, **Fr. Thomas McDermott, O.P.**, Assistant Professor of Spiritual Theology, and Fr. Patrick Nwokoye, Class of 2001, of the Diocese of Springfield-Cape Girardeau gave an afternoon conference for seminarians at St. Meinrad School of Theology in Indiana on the topic of effective collaboration with foreign-born priests in American dioceses.



On October 20, Associate Professor of Intercultural Studies **Dr. Sebastian Mahfood** and his wife, Dr. Stephanie Mahfood, celebrated the birth of their second child, Eva Ruth Mahfood, at St. John's Mercy Hospital. Weighing 6 pounds and 5 ounces, Eva was born at 9:12 A.M.



Dr. John Gresham, Associate Professor of Systematic Theology, brought a Catholic perspective to the 2008 Theological Symposium on Lutheran Ecclesiology hosted by Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, September 23-24. Dr. Gresham gave a response to one of the plenary papers, "The Church and the Churches" and also gave a presentation on "The Mission of the Bride: Bridal Ecclesiology and the Mission of the Church." At the Pauline Symposium, hosted by Aquinas Institute on October 3, Dr. Gresham presented a paper on "St. Paul's Theology of the Body: John Paul II's Interpretation of St. Paul in *Theology of the Body*." On October 16, Dr. Gresham told the men's group at Assumption Parish in O'Fallon the story of his journey of faith to the Catholic Church and on October 20 presented his story to a large gathering at Our Lady of the Lake Parish in Branson.

Office of Vocations Bids Farewell to Msgr. Michael Butler

After thirteen years of promoting vocations for the Archdiocese of St. Louis, Msgr. Michael Butler officially stepped out of the Office of Vocations on August 1, 2008 and stepped into full-time military service. First serving as a Catholic Chaplain in 1989, he has always been inspired to offer his spiritual services to Catholics serving in the military. That willingness to serve now takes him in a new direction, one where he will build upon his prior experience as he will continue to promote vocations while ministering to the spiritual needs of men and women in the military.

Msgr. Butler began his military career training as a Chaplain Candidate at Nellis Air Force Base (Nevada) in the summer of 1985 and Dover Air Force Base (Delaware) in the summer of 1986. Upon ordination to the priesthood in 1989, he served as Associate Pastor of St. Cletus Parish in St. Charles, Missouri. In July of the same year, he received his

commission as Catholic Chaplain with the 131st Fighter Wing, Missouri National Guard. In 2002, Msgr. Butler began his assignment as Wing Chaplain of the 131st Fighter Wing, Mis-

souri National Guard. He has been on seven deployments since September 11, 2001.

During his years of service as Director of Vocations, Msgr. Butler implemented and expanded many programs sponsored by the Office of Vo-

cations that encourage vocations to the priesthood and religious life. Those programs include the highly successful Kenrick-Glennon Days, a summer camp held at the seminary for students (grades 5-9) considering a vocation to the priesthood, Camp Mater Dei, to promote religious life for young women, and ChristPower, a service program with a strong focus on vocations.

Msgr. Edward Rice, his replacement as Director of Vocations for the Archdiocese of St. Louis, remarked: "I am grateful to Msgr. Butler for his years of hard work in the Office of Vocations. I am stepping into a program that is well-organized, focused, and known for the high caliber of its programs." Msgr. Rice continued, "I've always considered Msgr. Butler a personal friend since our days together in the seminary. We worked well together when I was Director of Cardinal Glennon College and I feel honored to continue his good work."

Msgr. Butler is currently serving as Deputy Wing Chaplain at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas.

It seems to me that Kenrick-Glennon seeks to imprint this character upon her students and instill in them its importance, and not just within the classroom, but from the chapel to the refectory to the softball field. A man can learn the details of the faith in any major seminary, but the skill to communicate the true persons of God is more elusive.

Kenrick-Glennon, through prayer, daily life, the Sacraments, studies and her people, has found an effective means of imparting this skill to her men. Though I may not be the best example of it, its value is nearly inestimable.

Seminarian Follows Long and Winding Road to Kenrick-Glennon

I was born on April 3, 1967 in Tucson, Arizona. On July 20 of that same year, my father, a major in the United States Air Force, was killed in action over Pleiku, South Vietnam. I was raised by my mom with help from her parents.

In school I excelled in both studies and social activities and was active in Church. I graduated high school with a 3.75 GPA, was awarded two scholarships, and named in the *Who's Who of American High School Students*. Upon graduation from high school I attended a community college and earned an Associate of Arts degree.

I then moved to Los Angeles to attend the University of California, Los Angeles with a double major in International Relations and International Law. While attending College, I worked for Schaffer Ambulance.

I enlisted in the Air Force just before the first Desert Storm (1990) began. While in the Air Force I traveled extensively throughout Europe and Southwest Asia. I served in numerous operations including Desert Storm and served in positions both in NATO and with the United Nations. I was also selected as a member of the space shuttle Rescue and Recovery team. There is a saying that "there are no atheists in foxholes" and it was during my missions, especially the Desert Storm conflict and the Khobar Tower bombing, that I really started regaining my faith and conviction in the Catholic Church and in my Savior, Jesus Christ. It was also during this time that I made a firm and conscious decision, over and above my Confirmation, that I wanted to belong and remain a practicing and true member of the Roman Catholic Church. My last duty station was Peterson Air Force Base in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

During my career in the United States Air Force, I was promoted to the rank of Staff Sergeant and received numerous medals, unit and organizational

citations, and personal awards. I look back on my career in the United States Air Force and realize that God provided me the opportunity to return to and deepen my faith, see the world, experience other peoples and cultures, and provide me with a belief system and discipline that will sustain me for the rest of my life.

After leaving the military, I worked for a mortgage company for a little over a year before I was offered a position as a loan officer for TCF Bank. I also continued my firefighting career by volunteering with Tri-Lakes Monument Fire, the El Paso County Sheriff's Department Hazardous Materials Team and several other local departments. I was happy to work shifts during my off time and responded when needed. I was also involved in several military veterans groups.

My tenure with TCF Bank was successful and I found myself where I never expected to be. I started out as a loan officer and within the first year was asked to manage the first free-standing TCF Bank in the state of Colorado. That branch grew from \$50,000 to in excess of \$12 million in four years. This significantly exceeded the model for a new branch as set forth by the company. I was eventually promoted to the position of regional manager. Thereafter, I was promoted to Vice President and was asked to open and head a new department for the bank. Within five years of starting at the bank, I found myself the Vice President in charge of Bankruptcy/Foreclosure/REO Properties for the state of Colorado. Remembering that I had no experience or training in this career field prior to starting with the bank, I can only thank God for my success.

In November of 2005, I again started considering the priesthood. This time was quite different from all the other times

(since age 12) that I had considered the priesthood. By February of 2006 I knew I had to talk to someone about this call that was getting stronger and stronger and wouldn't let me rest. I sat down after a Sunday Mass with my pastor. He directed me to speak with Father Jim Williams, the vocation director for my diocese. Over the next three years I followed the direction of my spiritual and vocation directors to discern my call to the priesthood. As I was previously married, I also went through the annulment process during this time.

Once again I have placed my entire life in God's hands. I sold my home as

well as most of my belongings in anticipation of entering the seminary. As I reflect back upon my life I realize that God has always guided my path in life whether I realized it or not; whether I wanted Him to or not. I realize that He has always placed good people in my life to help me and support me. He provided a solid foundation with my mother and grandparents

to form my faith in a strong and resilient way. I find the common thread throughout all of my careers and jobs is a desire to help others. I realize that the directions I have taken, and the careers I have chosen, have provided me with the experience that I will need to be a good priest, a good counselor, and work for the greater glory of God. It is with great humility and deep gratitude that I look upon my life and thank God for the provisions, people, and guidance He has granted. I pray that He will continue to guide me and provide me with the graces needed to heed His call. I now look forward to the next chapter in my life with great expectation and anticipation. It is with humility and gratitude that I look forward to being a priest in the Roman Catholic Church.

Seminary, assisted by seminarians. The former West Dorm was made into 17 individual rooms for seminarians, to accommodate growing enrollment, which has increased for three consecutive years and is currently at its highest level in over 20 years. Kenrick-Glennon Seminary now serves 117 men from 17 dioceses.

The former East Dorm was renovated into seventeen new rooms in 1987 when the School of Theology and the School of Philosophy were combined into the present building. The former East dorm was also blessed on October 15 and has now been given the name "St. Augustine Hall" as it is on the School of Theology side of the building. The newly-renovated West Dorm hall was renamed "St. Thomas Aquinas Hall." About 140 people—priests, seminarians and guests—attended the October 15 blessing.



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
